Happy Birthday Hornbill School 15 Years Old

At the start of this academic year Hornbill turned 15... but our history goes back even further than 15 years. The Gurkha Children's English School (GCES) was opened in Medicina Lines during the early 60s as a school for children of the serving battalion. The school moved to our present site in the 70s with purpose-built rooms including science labs and a well-stocked library. Additionally, in 1973 the Seria Service Children's School was opened in Mumong for non-Nepali children. Following GMAS in 2003 Hornbill School was conceived as a way of uniting the two schools and joining together the Nepali and non-Nepali communities here in Brunei. The original Hornbill School stayed on two sites with FS1 and FS2 in Mumong and Key Stages 1 and 2 here in Seria.

Mrs. Wood became the first official Headteacher of Hornbill School when she arrived in April 2004.

Hornbill continued to grow and by 2010 we had over 550 children on role. We had out grown our buildings, which by that point included two officer houses on X1 (turned into 4 classrooms) and 2 old SSAFA rooms by the PCMF. In May 2011 HRH Princess Sarah officially opened our new purpose built EYFS area, Cyber Zone and Administration offices. However, due to logistical reasons it was not until September 2012 that we had all of our children here on one

In effect we are celebrating our 56th Birthday!

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Throughout this year we are working in every class to Build the Learning Power (BLP) of our pupils.

From this August all pupils of Hornbill School will have specific lessons on to be powerful learners through dedicated session planned at regular intervals throughout the academic year. These lessons are entitled **Flying Lessons** in which children will learn how to become powerful learners.





While we have answered this question in the past, there are still some parents who request hot dinners. Therefore we have answered this question again to help your thinking.

Answer: Hornbill School was created to work on Tropical Hours. This means there is not a dedicated hour for lunch time for this to happen. Additionally, we do not have the infrastructure to cook meals for 200+ pupils.

A one hour lunch break (as in the UK) would also mean children are outside in the midday sun for 30 minutes - which is not recommended.

Unfortunately this is not something we can action or develop further.



Nepali Reading, Writing & Culture Lessons

Question: A small number of Nepali parents have stated that they would like lessons to support their child's development in Nepali reading, writing and culture.

Answer: All Nepali children in Years 1-6 have the opportunity to learn aspects of the Nepali curriculum. Lessons are on Monday and Fridays from 1330hrs to 1430hrs.

We are also looking to provide Nepali lessons for non Nepali children in Term 2.



Parent Meetings

Question: A number of parents have asked us to 1) look at how appointments are booked and 2) What times parent meetings can be held?

Answer 1): A new method of booking parent meetings has been researched. This will be shared with parents in the next few weeks.

Answer 2): There will now be two days put aside for parent meetings. This will include a later session for parents who are unable to make appointments during the afternoon.

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Learning

Year 3 Junction

During the Year 3 Junction pupils interviewed parents about their lives within the Army and as members of the garrison. This was coupled with learning about a soldier's life; where children and parents worked together to construct a jungle shelter and take part

in a physical training activity.





Children and parents looked at the life of Nelson Mandela and his Long Walk to Freedom. Children and parents explored the British colonial past in South Africa and highlighted the journey South Africa and Nelson Mandela took from conflict, to peace, to reconciliation. Activities included; African drumming, baking and painting.



Year 5 Junction

The Year 5 Junction was based around the role of Gurkhas in conflict and peace. The work explored the World Wars - I and II. During the day the children enjoyed carrying out their very own evacuation: the siren sounded, everyone hid under the table as they would have done during WWII and then 'evacuated'. After safely evacuating they witnessed a woman recalling her 'real' evacuation. Mums, Dads

and the children, as evacuees, enjoyed writing their postcards to send home, creating their own propaganda posters and completing a questionnaire and research about artefacts.










