Each year at Hornbill School, we offer an Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) known as the Drama & Music Workshop. Children who get involved in this ELO work as a team with a group of staff (the 'Production Team') to put together and perform a show. This year we have been working hard to present, 'The Firework Maker's Daughter'. Philip Pullman is the author of the play which is also a book of the same title.

In September we began to rehearse during our Tuesday and Thursday ELO sessions and, as the months have passed by, we have been able to learn lines, song words, dances and stage directions to create the wonderful performances on the afternoon and evening of Wednesday 24th and the evening of Thursday 25th of March. As one of very few schools in the world able to do so at this time, we feel very blessed to have been able to accomplish this.



The Firework Maker's Daughter is the story of Lila, the daughter of Lalchand who is an established and experienced firework maker. It is her dream to follow in her father's footsteps. As for Lalchand, it isn't the destiny he wishes for her and he actively tries to prevent her from finding out the secret of his art. Through grit, determination and the help of her friend, Chulak, Lila goes on an adventure that will lead her through deep, dark rainforest and into the heart of a bubbling volcano.







As a story to stage, there have been several interesting challenges to overcome. The story includes a talking elephant, a mountainous volcano and the need for a lot of firework firepower. As resilient Hornbillers, these are challenges which we have relished and - with Mr Gill's stage set creativity and love of special effects - it all became possible. Smoke machines, glitter cannons, sparkling LED fireworks and even pyrotechnics all came together to create a dazzling display and a rich background to our amazing cast whose acting, singing and dancing were accentuated by these effects.



This year, 26 children were involved in the Drama & Music Workshop which is an ELO offered to all children in Years 4, 5 and 6. As ever, our Hornbillers gave their full commitment to creating three sensational performances to audiences totalling well over 250 of our Hornbill and garrison community. Each year, our performers make their way through the process of learning lines, lyrics, moves and actions and -when it comes to performing - they enthral us with their ability to deliver their roles to a level above and beyond our wildest expectations. Once initial nerves have been overcome, our performers begin to relax and even add in further ad lib flourishes. They deal with any unexpected stage, prop or costume eventualities with professionalism way beyond their age and come together as a supportive group of children ready to back each other up at any given moment.

Truly, these Hornbillers have been positively engaged and have delivered to our community a rarity in Brunei – live theatre. We look forward to starting the process once again in September with a new story, a new cast and a fresh set of challenges to relish.

- 5. At aged 7, Spartan boys were taken away from their parents and were sent off for military training.
- 6. The Acropolis, which is part of a series of hills including Likavitos hill, the Philopappos hill, the hill of the Nymphs, and the Pnyx.

- 10. Arachne was turned into a spider (Arachnid) because she had insulted Athene.
