Our Year 4 team, swimming in their first swim gala for school, were narrowly beaten into second place but this is a magnificent achievement to win against other schools who have a whole host of super talented swimmers. Our Year 5 team came third and this again was a superb team effort against some swimmers who are national athletes.

## Our Creative Community Art Update

An exciting moment for our community of Hornbill artists: Hornbill artwork to be exhibited at the National Gallery, Trafalgar Square, London!

In January 2020, we enjoyed a 'Take One Picture' arts week. Take One Picture is an initiative run annually by the National Gallery in London. The National Gallery selects a painting which acts as a stimulus for the week and schools across the UK create artwork in response to it. The painting selected by the gallery for the week was 'The Battle of San Romano' by Paulo Uccello.



Each school that takes part sends a submission to the National Gallery, outlining the way that they approached the project and including photos of the artwork created. Analysing the submissions, the National Gallery then selects pieces of artwork to form their Take One Picture exhibition. We are incredibly proud to have been chosen to have our artwork in this year's exhibition. Previously, we were also selected to be a part of the exhibition in 2017. What an honour to have our artwork selected!

We enjoyed embracing the painting within a sequence of art lessons for each year group. We considered the painting and how best we could link this with our values. We focused our attention on a line from the song 'When a knight won his spurs', which the children have learned in their community singing time:

'Let faith be my shield and let joy be my steed'



This led us to the idea of creating our own 'values battle' scene with each fighting soldier battling using the power of their own chosen value. We decided to make a large battle scene depicting knights on horseback and foot soldiers; every fighting character would have a value written on their armour. We discussed the values that are needed to have the strength to overcome challenging times and came up with a list which included values such as: joy, love, hope, truth, peace, happiness, care, concern and courtesy. Artists from Years 3 to 6 created their own print to add to the scene. Years 1 and 2 worked on a similar, separate piece of artwork.



The second element to our shared piece of artwork was to integrate the line from the song into the piece. We considered the medieval setting of the San Romano battle and chose to use illuminated lettering to do SO.



The exhibition opens on the 17th June and runs until the 12th September. There will also be a digital page launched through the National Gallery's website. The National Gallery will also send us some extra photos which will be published in a later edition of the Gazette. Should you have relatives in the UK who would be able to visit the exhibition in person, they will need to book through the National Gallery website.

They use their learning powers of communication and reflection to adapt and amend their work to reach their goal.
