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Wednesday is Mobile Library Day!

Here at Hornbill School we take reading very seriously. Over the last few years we have built a very strong reading focus and a very full lending library of just over 42,000 books.

When we found out that school would be closed and families could not move about like they were able to in the last lockdown, one of our first concerns was how we ensured reading would continue. As we can not have children in school to collect books we decided to take the books to the children.

So we have created an old fashioned Mobile Library where we take just over 2,500 books from first readers to free readers to set locations around the BFB community. To comply with Ministry of Health requirements we spread all books out in a location and have very strict rules on the number of people searching for and taking books home. This includes social distancing and ensuring all pupils wear face masks as per Brunei guidance.









To date this has resulted in 84% of pupils accessing the library weekly. This is not just about reading... The Mobile Library also allows class teachers to

send learning packs to pupils and collect learning from pupils which is returned to school. Pupils are also able to have quick (socially distanced) conversations with other pupils - which is helping child wellbeing.

The Mobile Library is manned each week by members of the Strategic Leadership Team

so that parents are able to discuss home learning concerns or questions which are then followed up back at school.



Our next step is to try a Lend a Pupil session to try and provide opportunities for pupils to sit distanced from another pupil and talk. We aim to use this to help pupil wellbeing of those pupils who are unable to talk to another child during lockdown - watch this space.

Let's get to know some of our teachers and staff during this



Learning to Learn Building Learning Powers

Focus on: Online Community Learning Time

During the academic year 2020-2021, we enjoyed a series of fantastically communicative Community Learning Time sessions in school each Monday. During these times, with Years 1 to 6 gathered together in our school hall, we developed our understanding of what it means to be a great learner through lots of mixedage, paired communication challenges. We also spent valuable time making decisions together about really important aspects of learning at Hornbill School, including the choice of animals that we wanted to represent our learning powers.

ideas covered. The Friday session develops the ideas from the Monday session further.

Our core driver, 'community' was the first to be explored and encouraged thinking about what a community is and how we can make a community a strong, happy place to belong to. The focus was placed on our family communities, as this is currently the community with whom we are spending the majority of our time during home learning. We also considered the great example of strong family communities that hornbill bird families set, with their strong bonds and co-operative, caring nature.



When it became evident that we would need to start this new school year with home learning, it felt really important to maintain our Community Learning Time sessions to continue to build up our whole school community understanding of our core drivers: community, citizenship and metacognition. In the first week of home learning, a trailer video was sent out introducing the upcoming CLT video sessions. Each Monday and Friday, a CLT session video is now posted to each class page. These are approximately 5 minutes long, designed to be watched as a family and

filled with moments to pause and discuss the

The second core driver to be considered was 'citizenship'. Understanding that each person in a community is a citizen of that community, leads us to think about the values that we each need to use to do our part to make the community strong. Care, courtesy, challenge, celebration and co-operation are key values at Hornbill School. CLT participants were encouraged to discuss how we can use values to overcome challenges in life such as unkindness, disappointment and anger.

Upcoming CLT sessions will explore the third core driver – metacognition - and the 8 learning powers that are central to all areas of our learning development. Do take time to watch these videos together as a family. They will continue to be posted each Monday and Friday for the duration of the home learning period.

ClassDojo is our home learning platform. It enables our whole school community to have its own thread for informative messages sent out to parents. It also enables each individual class community to have its own space for the posting of messages, videos, photos and so on. During 'regular' in-school times, ClassDojo provides a link between school and home – an opportunity to share with parents what's been going on in the classroom and to create a communication link. During home learning times, ClassDojo becomes an incredibly important tool for the sharing of daily learning.

As in the home learning period we experienced in 2020, ClassDojo has once again become a hive of activity across all year groups. Each day learning opportunities are posted onto the ClassDojo page and accessed by learners and their parents. By the end of the second week of Home Learning, an astonishing 4,880 photos and videos had been shared within our school community using ClassDojo. That's amazing and a testament to our wonderful community of learners.

As well as class teachers uploading a wide variety of learning opportunities to ClassDojo, Mr Tomlin – our PE leader - has been posting daily physical challenges. Mr Brown, our arts leader, has enjoyed the wonderfully creative outcomes of his Matisse Art challenge and is eagerly

awaiting the wonderful pieces of artwork which will be stimulated by Frank Stella's artistic style in his 2nd fortnightly challenge. Mrs Brown – our learning leader – has been posting daily chapters of Roald Dahl's 'James and the Giant Peach' and also twice weekly CLT sessions. There really is a wide range of learning opportunities to get involved in covering all aspects of the curriculum and also wellbeing, which Mrs Marden has been championing.



The strength of our parental community shines through via the ClassDojo posts that are uploaded by families. The amazing learning occurring at home is very evident with parents taking part in all aspects of the process very effectively. Thank you – you are all very much high flying Hornbillers!



Creative Ousical Obagic at the Rhythmic Arts End of Germ Obusic Recital

Covering the wide range of musical learning options that Rhythmic Arts provides, our community of Hornbill musicians performed instruments including: classical guitar, electric guitar, violin, drums, piano and voice. Some of these performances were solos, some were duets with the Rhythmic Arts teachers and some were duet and group performances with other learners.









Hornbill School Artists Exhibit at the National Gallery London

Hornbill School artists have had the honour of exhibiting a large piece of artwork within the National Gallery's 'Take One Picture' exhibition! Take One Picture is an initiative run annually by the National Gallery in London. The National Gallery selects a

painting which acts as a stimulus for the week and schools across the UK create



artwork in response to it. Each school that takes part sends a submission to the National Gallery outlining the way that they approached the project and including photos of the artwork created.

In January 2020, we enjoyed a 'Take One Picture' arts week. The painting selected by the gallery for the week was 'The Battle of San Romano' by Paulo Uccello. After analysing all the submissions from across the UK, the National Gallery selected our piece entitled 'Let faith Be My Shield, Joy Be My Steed' to form part of the exhibition.

As the majority of us have personally been unable to visit the exhibition, the National have kindly sent these photos of our artwork in place. Also, excitingly, current Hornbillers - the Cunningham family - and Hornbill Alumni, the Porter family, have been able to visit the exhibition on their return to the UK. They spent time looking at the 'Take One Picture' exhibition, locating our Hornbill artwork and seeing how other schools had approached the same challenge, creating their own responses to the Uccello painting. The families were also able to enjoy the rest of the gallery, noting a range of paintings and works of painters that they recognise from their art learning at Hornbill School.

We are incredibly happy to have been chosen to have our artwork in this year's exhibition. Previously, we were also selected to be a part of the exhibition in 2017. What an honour to have our artwork selected and what a celebration of the creativity of our Hornbill community of artists!

Tennis Ball Tuesdays



Well-Being Wednesdays




