In 2022, Her Majesty the Queen became the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee after 70 years of service.

To celebrate Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, children across the whole school had a 'street party' styled big brunch session by the reflection garden as the UK has a long history of organised street parties to celebrate national events. The children all wore either red, white, blue or purple clothing to match the colours of the Union Flag and the colour of the Jubilee.



At the end of the brunch session, the beacon was lit as a part of the UK's tradition of celebrating Royal Jubilees and special events through beacon lighting.

As a part of the Jubilee celebrations, the children also had an exciting week of learning about countries in the commonwealth. All the classes made display boards about the countries they have been learning which are proudly displayed along the main corridor by the reflection garden.



Ghe Queen's Green Canopy

The Queen's Green Canopy is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 which invites people from across the UK to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee". We are very thankful for the help of many families in Hornbill who purchased and planted their trees to support our Queen's Green Canopy and the extension of our Jungle School area. Over the coming years, the current and future pupils of Hornbill School will protect this area as it grows and develops.

The planting of a small sapling means that children can experience the development of our canopy, they can map its growth and watch as it matures. For some children, when they return to Brunei in future years, they will be able to pick out their own tree and tell others that they planted it.

Our Creative Community - Art Update

A lot of wonderful creativity is in action across all year groups. Here's a flavour of what each year group has been doing!

FS 2 Dream Catchers

FS2 have used a variety of materials to create their own 'Dream Catchers'. This involved making bead strings, sewing around the edge of a felt shape and weaving. It was great to see these learners using their hands in these different ways, handling materials with varied textures, sizes and shapes. The outcomes are really stunning and so interesting to look at.





Linking in with **Year 1**'s

learning pathway, 'Our Local Environment', the children focused on observing the lines of buildings and structures. From this they carried out various observational drawings. Using these drawings, the children used their fingers and hands to mould wet shredded paper into the shape of their chosen local building or structure. Once the paper had dried out, paint was used by the children to add colour. It was then cut out to be stuck onto a background. The children explored blending paint to create a stunning background to represent either the bright blue Bruneian skies or the beauty of a Bruneian sunset.



Year 2 have been cumulatively creating their own art gallery of inspiration. Works of art within their galleries are based on a study of four artists: Bridget Riley, Sonia Delauney, Joan Miro and Jackson Pollock. Exploring the individual style of each of these artists, Year 2 learners were then able to create their own artwork inspired by what they had discovered. To house these wonderful works of art, they then created their own 3D gallery and displayed them with pride

with pride.



Year 3 completed the Viking Shields that they had begun work on in Term 2. Now painted and decorated with patterns, these are incredibly eye-catching and also give the impression of the strength needed for Viking combat. Moving on to a new artistic learning journey, Year 3s are currently exploring the work of the great artist Picasso. Inspired by his ability to creatively portray faces from a different perspective, Year 3 are creating their own Picasso-style face portraits. These will be both colourful and quirky, just as Picasso did himself!




Year 4 completed an exploration of Tamara Madden's work, creating their final outcome pieces which achieved, like Madden, the ability to use a variety of materials within one portrait for a striking effect. Continuing to focus on the way in which artists can portray human emotion without the need for defined skin tone, Year 4 engaged in printing, using styrofoam, portraits of themselves which showed very clearly defined expressions of emotion with a background of multiple layered colours.



Year 5 were excited to complete their alien heads, a project which took them from an initial design to a wonderful 3D sculpture, painted with varied tones and decorated with some additional materials including wool and sequins. They really are sculptures to be proud of, each with their own characteristics and out-of-this-world quality.



Moving onto a new learning pathway, World War 2, Year 5 have been exploring the juxtaposition of 'Home and Away' during that period of history. After exploring images of 1940s life both at 'home' and on the front line, learners have created a dual-focus drawing, comparing these two aspects. Some have taken vehicles as their design stimulus, others clothing, weaponry, gardening and so on. After using drawing pencils to sketch out the outline of their image, they have been using coloured pencils and watercolours to add colour and detail.



Year 6 began the term by completing the final touches needed for their Chinese banners. These look fantastic and are an excellent testament to the gentle brushstrokes of the ancient Chinese artists who inspired them.


As the Year 6 children are ending their time at Hornbill School, they began to create a lasting memory of their time as learners in Brunei – a Hornbill sculpture. Exploring the various stances of hornbills, both in flight and stationary, wings spread and tucked in, the learners selected a stance to take forward into a sculpture. Starting with newspaper, art straws and tape, the initial body structure was created. It was then strengthened by the addition of a layer of Modroc. Using acrylic paint, the shiny black of the hornbill's feathers was completed.



Raise the Banner

Following the successful creation of two banners which are proudly displayed in the Multi-Purpose Hall, it was time to create a third one. The first banner displays the message, 'We are the children of Hornbill School.'. The second displays the message, 'Once a Hornbiller, always a Hornbiller.' This third banner shares our school vision: 'Powerful Hornbillers are positively engaged citizens.'





During the third term of the last academic year, learners from Years 4, 5 and 6 signed up for the ELO 'Raise the Banner'. During the sessions, the children designed figures to surround the wording and then made these figures using felt. The felt figures were sewn, along with the lettering, onto the banner. It will soon join the other banners in the Multi-Purpose Hall and will be enjoyed by all as they spend time in this learning space for CLT, singing time, badge assemblies and other learning opportunities. Well done to all those learners involved in creating this wonderful piece of shared artwork.



COMMUNITY ART LEGACY PROJECT

As we prepare to say goodbye to many members of our Hornbill community, we begin to consider the importance of the legacy each valued member of our community has brought to our learning environment. To create a long-lasting legacy of the time these learners have spent at Hornbill School, I devised a creative community art legacy project.

Each learner was asked to create a design to fit within a 10 x 10cm square. The design brief shared was to think about favourite aspects of life in Brunei and at Hornbill School, whilst also considering the momentous Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Each learner from FS1 to Year 6 created their own design with a fantastic array of ideas emerging. These include favourite animals, buildings and landmarks, hobbies, flowers and trees and many more. Each design is being burned onto a square tile of wood. This creative skill is called 'pyrography'. Once the design has been burned on to the wood, it will be varnished and then added to a revolving cuboid – one of 16 – which will become a fantastic structure in our school grounds. All members of our community will be able to look at, touch, revolve and enjoy the structure, which

all together will include 320 unique legacy designs.

Citizenship:


