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## The Wind in the Willows

A Hornbill School Drama & Music Workshop Production

Back in Term 1 of this academic year, a group of courageous, creative learners chose to sign up for this year's Drama & Music Workshop production - The Wind in the Willows. Getting to know each other through drama activities and games, we got ready for some auditions in which members of group sang and recited learned lines from the script. We cast the varied roles and were ready to start rehearsing.

Throughout the rest of Term 1 and Term 2, we worked hard to learn the songs that accompanied our story, to learn lines and to bring together the positions, movements and interactions between characters to tell our audience this classic story. The story was originally written by Kenneth Grahame in 1908.







It's a story of four friends - Mr Toad, Mr Badger, Ratty and Mole who live by the river and in the woods. Their adventures follow the seasons of the year and each character plays an important role in their community. Mr Badger uses his wisdom to help others make the right decisions and to rescue Toad Hall from the stoats and weasels who try to overrun it. Ratty befriends Mole and helps him to learn the wonders of boating along the river. They all support Mr Toad through his varied crazes, trying their best to rein in his urges to drive fast cars and to get himself in plenty of trouble.











As Term 3 began, our rehearsals extended to some Saturday sessions as we finalised the show. Our actors and actresses showed great commitment, putting in lots of effort and energy both at school and at home. We saw and heard very clearly increases in levels of confidence, volume, expression and ease of movements as our show time crept closer.









Finally, we were ready to perform! We were thrilled to have two fully-booked audiences who came to support us and to enjoy the outcome of our hard work. Our first performance was on a Thursday afternoon and we performed with creativity, courage and excellent communication. It was so exciting to be in costume with full face paints and special microphones to help us to give our best. The second performance was an evening performance the day after and, as the sun set outside, the stage lights came on to give amazing lighting effects to add to the costumes, sound, voices and songs. What a show!









We were so proud of our cast! They were, as Mr Toad says himself in the story, 'simply glorious!'. The support crew which comprised so many teaching staff also really enabled the whole experience of the performance to be phenomenal. We are very grateful to them for their time and energy.



### WONDERFULLY CREATI E HORNBILLERS THE TERM 3 ARTS JOURNEY BEGINS!

All year groups have continued to develop many learning powers and skills throughout their art learning this term.

This term, FS2 started by using the stimulus of Elmer the elephant to create their own Elmer card sculpture. They excitedly explored scrape art which involved applying oil pastel onto cardboard followed by a layer of wet black paint. Using various scraping tools, the black paint was scraped to reveal the array of wonderful colours beneath the paint! String art was carried out on top of this board to add further interest and texture. Using cardboard to print with, they created a landscape tree collage based on the work of textile artist Eloise Renov.







Year 1 have been looking at superheroes and have been creating superhero shields. This has allowed them to explore how to layer shapes in order to

create depth, the layering on of patterns to add detail, the use of art straws to create texture and relief and the careful, precise use of sequins to add further interest to their artwork.





Year 2 have focused on a number of inspirational and ground-breaking artists. They explored the work of Sonia Delaunay, Jackson Pollock, Joan Miro, Bridget Riley and Georgia O'Keeffe. Year 2 took inspiration from these artists and created their own pieces of artwork inspired by the style of these artists. They explored a variety of ways to create artwork including paint dripping, collage, felt tip pens, manipulating line, oil resist, still life drawing and tissue paper collage.







Year 3 artists explored and developed various skills through their creation of an Egyptian God or Goddess artwork. They focused on line and shape as they explored Egyptian



Gods and Goddesses. Having chosen one, they drew it out, added colour and cut it out. To create a textured background, they created a Styrofoam printing block.

Using careful, controlled energy, each artist engraved an Ancient Egyptian symbol into the Styrofoam. They used printing ink, in two colours, to print the symbol. For the frame of the picture, they used foil and, after exploring the technique of 'embossing', they used this skill to add decoration and detail to the frame.



Year 4 have been on a journey of Greek discovery through their exploration of Greek vases. The children developed their sculpting skills using papier mâché to sculpt a vase. To add detail, the children painted on Greek patterns. They explored Greek mythical creatures which they used as a stimulus to draw their own similar creatures, recreating their pencil drawing using an art technique called sgraffito. Their sgraffito mythical creature was cut out and stuck onto their vase to complete it.





Linking in with Year 5's exploration of the Anglo-Saxons, they explored sources of Anglo-Saxon art. One area where such artwork is found is on Anglo-Saxon stone crosses. In their sketchbooks they explored the artwork on these stone crosses. Having carried out this exploration, they designed their own Anglo-Saxon inspired cross. Using cardboard in a variety of ways to create texture and depth the Year 5 artists then constructed their cross. Brushes and sponges were used to add paint to create highlighted areas and shaded areas. Drawing on this experience and following exploration of Anglo-Saxon jewellery, Year 5 designed and created their own Anglo-Saxon pendant.





As the Year 6 children end their time at Hornbill School, they began to create a lasting memory of their time as learners in Brunei - a Hornbill sculpture. Exploring the various stances of hornbills, both in flight and stationary, wings spread and tucked in, the learners selected a stance to take forward into a sculpture. Starting with newspaper, art straws and tape, the initial body structure was created. It was then strengthened by the addition of a layer of Modroc. Using acrylic paint, the shiny black of the hornbill's feathers was completed.



## SPORT UPDATE #

During the May half term some children from Years 5 & 6 took part in the Kuala Belait U11 football competition where they played against other local schools and football teams. They performed brilliantly throughout and ended the day in 2nd place after playing 7 matches.



In June we had our final BJSL competition of the year when 4 teams from Years 4 - 6 travelled the short distance to BSRC to compete in the T-Ball tournament. There was some excellent fielding and striking skills on display and all teams had a great day representing the school.

In the last few weeks of term we held our swimming galas for each year group. Children were able to showcase their swimming skills, which they have refined throughout the year, across and mixture of competitive and fun races.

# Learning to Learn Building Learning Powers

Focus on: Learning about learning

This term, in our Community Learning Time sessions, we've continued to learn more about how our brains work when we are learning. We can be even more powerful 'Powerful Hornbillers' if we understand what happens in our brains when we learn.

We started by reviewing and deepening our understanding of the 4 main features at work as we learn - our learning environment, our attention, our working memory and our long-term memory. We know that our learning environment is jam-packed full of different elements, all constantly clamouring for our attention. Those things that we choose to pay attention to are the aspects of our environment that have the chance to enter our working memory to be thought about. If we think about these items in our working memory sufficiently, they have the chance to enter our long-term memory, especially if we return to thinking about them repeatedly.

Understanding this enables us to be powerful learners because we can be more careful and selective in what we allow to capture our attention when we are learning. When we asked our learners about the times when they are less keen on learning, they said that one factor is 'being distracted'. This is when our attention is taken away from the learning input towards other aspects of ourselves or our environment that take up valuable space in our limited working memory capacity (4-6 items at most). We explored 'distraction' in our Community Learning Time sessions this term and talked together about these distractions, as examples:

·I'm not keen on learning when I'm sleepy.



·I'm not keen on learning when I'm hungry.



·I'm not keen on learning when I'm sad.

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We discovered that these feelings can turn our attention away from learning by filling our minds with distracting emotions or, in the case of sleepiness, can prevent us from holding so many elements in our working memory at once. 0

Knowing about the effect these distractions can have on our learning, we discussed what we can do about it:



·making sure to prioritise a good sleep each night to be fresh for learning

·eating enough to feel full up whilst learning and choosing foods for a healthy, balanced diet (as well as staying hydrated)



·being good citizens to support others around us to feel positive emotions



·being aware of our own emotions and, if we are feeling sad, communicating this to others - where possible - so that they are also aware and can help us

We also explored the way in which we, as learners, sometime distract each other. Our learners gave lots of good and honest reasons for why this can sometimes happen:

·a feeling of excitement about something that has or soon will happen

·a feeling of curiosity or interest in something other than the current

learning

·a feeling of boredom

...and more.



It was good to discuss distractions that come from these origins and the way that verbal or non-verbal communication, in these forms, again takes up valuable space in working memory. When a learner beside us is busy learning with a full working memory and we add a distraction to that, inevitably, some of their current thinking falls away as the space is replaced by the distraction. It can take quite some time for them to return to their absorbed state of mind after this. As fellow learners and fellow citizens of the learning environment, we need to avoid causing distractions, wherever possible. We all do this at times, even teachers and parents, but — as powerful learners — we need to do everything we can to control the distraction we create and know how to respond to it around us.

I can't wait to continue our 'learning about learning' journey in the new academic year. Powerful Hornbillers are positively engaged citizens. Powerful Hornbillers, who know a lot about how we learn and how to maximise learning opportunities, are especially powerful!

We started the Term by opening our doors to parents for EYFS and KS1 Maths morning session followed by Phonics with the aim to give our parents an opportunity to look at how Maths and Phonics is taught at school, as well as an opportunity for them to look at the progression of the curricular objectives from FS1 through to the end of Key stage 1. We have continued to build on the parent-school partnership through our engagement with parents about our Focus children each week.

Reading stories, singing songs and rhymes in addition to having meaningful interactions with a view to develop children's language has continued to be an integral part of the daily provisions. An equal emphasis on Mathematical development has been provided through activities that have a Maths focus for children to explore as soon as they walk in through the door. In addition, we have ensured that our children have strong foundations in phonological awareness through daily Phonics sessions.

As play is at the centre of our approach in FS1, the children have continued to enjoy and explore various activities as part of their outdoor provision as well as sporting activities indoors through our PE sessions.











The FS festival hosted by Hornbill School brought various agencies and departments in the Garrison together and as a result provided the parents and their children in Foundation Stage 1 an opportunity not only to get to know what services they provide but also get to interact with them as a part of the wider Garrison community. The Festival also provided our children an opportunity to grow in confidence and showcase their talents and ofcourse, a whole lot of fun!

We were then visited by the Royal Military Police who came into school to explain the role of their job within our community. We found out more about how we can stay safe and had the opportunity to explore their equipment including the police car, protective vests, handcuffs and batons.

Our next superheroes to visit school had four legs! The Garrison Working Military Dogs, accompanied by the Dog Handlers, came to demonstrate their skills and taught us more about their important role in the garrison. We created a scent trail for the dogs to track in order to find a 'missing' item, learned about the equipment that the handlers use when training, caring for and working with the dogs, and found out about how the dogs use their heightened senses to carry out their incredible work.











Our final exciting visit was a trip to 230 Squadron at Medicina Lines. We had the opportunity to go inside a Puma helicopter, which was huge! We learned about the role of the winch medic and the engineers explained how they maintain the Pumas.




# Year 2

During the final term, Octopus class have been inspired and amazed by historic adventures and modern-day exploration. As part of the learning pathway, the children have researched and investigated famous individuals, who have been influential in their field of exploration. We have blasted into space with Neil Armstrong; dived to the bottom of the ocean with Sylvia Earle; sailed the great oceans with Charles Darwin and scaled Everest with Tenzing Norgay, Edmund Hillary and Nims Purja. As part of our English sessions, the children gathered facts and information to help publish a non-chronological report. They have used what they found out to compare similarities and differences between the same adventures and journeys taken during modern times. Their curiosity has led them to wonder what it is like to explore other environments such as deserts and the jungles that surround us. In our DT sessions, the children have studied the different food groups and learnt about the changing sugar levels in a variety of food. They planned and made a smoothie that was high in sugars and perfect for providing energy during an ambitious and dangerous expedition.







Children in Year 3 have been learning about how early Egypt began and what it was like. They have used a range of historical skills including chronology, evidence and interpretations, historical significance and cause and consequence. Cleopatra VII visited us as part of our learning. In english, our outcome has been to write a biography of a famous person related to Ancient Egypt and present it using digital media. Cleopatra's visit gave opportunity to raise relevant research questions to write a biography. We have widened our range of unison songs by learning Egyptian themed songs. We have been learning to sing confidently and with expression. Mummy rag is fun to sing!

### English
