As another academic year closes, all Hornbillers can celebrate their wonderful exploration and development of their creativity and skills.

A highlight of FS2 art this term has been their exploration of primary colours and mixing to create secondary colours. They used butterfly printing and their mixing artwork to create a 'colourful creature.' They use their scissor skills to cut out a body, arms and legs and then layered on patterns and collaged on sequins to complete








their creature.



This term, Year 1 have been exploring heroes in our community and, in art, we have used superheroes as our theme. The children have considered many design and artistic skills when creating a superhero shield, superhero mask and superhero gadget. They also explored the artwork of American artist Roy Lichtenstein.

Year 2 have looked at pioneering artists who have been a source of inspiration. They looked at the artwork of French artist Sonia Delauney, American artist Jackson Pollock, Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama and American artist Georgia O'Keeffe. They used a range of mediums to create four different pieces of artwork which they presented in their own 'Gallery of Inspiration.'








Year 3 have been studying the Ancient Egyptians. They developed their drawing, colouring, printing and embossing skills through a mixed-media Egyptian God or Goddess portrait. They also studied the wonderful sculptures of Alberto Giacometti. Having curiously explored Giacometti's sculptures and Ancient Egyptian shabti dolls, the children designed and sculpted a Giacometti style shabti doll out of pipe cleaners and Modroc.





Year 4 having been exploring extreme weather events. We created a blizzard picture which involved creating a stencil, using paint and soft pastels. They also developed their painting skills with the challenge of showing movement and energy through their use of a paint brush.

Year 5 have looked at the artwork on Anglo-Saxon crosses. From this, the children designed their own Anglo-Saxon cross which they created out of cardboard. When painting their cross they considered how to use highlighting and shadows to create depth. Year 5 also used a range of beads, sequins and wool to create their own Anglo-Saxon pendant.

In our weekly community learning times, we've been working together to develop our communication skills. Communication is arguably one of our most important learning powers because it has a strong impact on our other learning powers and how effectively we can use them.

To develop our communication skills, we've explored lots of small skills which, together, combine to help us to be powerful communicators. Here are some of the skills we've been exploring and practising:

- acknowledging others as we meet them with responses which might be non-verbal (such as a nod, a wave or a smile), verbal responses (such as 'Good morning!', 'Hi!', 'How are you?' or other such greetings) or a mixture of both verbal and non-verbal.
- ensuring correct body language when we are communicating. This includes: facing the person, moving our whole body to comfortably direct our attention towards them as we communicate, maintaining eye contact and being still.
- making sure the person we are communicating with knows that we are listening. We've rehearsed non-verbal signals that we are listening (such as nodding, raising our eyebrows, changing our expression to match what we are hearing and so on). We've also tried out verbal responses which show we are listening but which do not interrupt the speaker.
- taking turns to speak, waiting until the person we are communicate has finished their point and indicates that we can reply.
- ways to show that we agree or disagree with what we have heard.

These are all really important skills, without which it is difficult to engage in effective communication. We'll continue to develop these skills in our new year of learning.

Year One

A review of the academic year for Year 1 reveals a year filled with exciting learning experiences and academic achievements. From engaging school trips to impressive progress across the curriculum, the Year 1 children have truly excelled.

One of the main highlights of the year were the numerous school trips that provided valuable learning opportunities for the children. From a visit to the Garrison Fire Department in Medicina Lines where they learned about firefighters and their equipment, to a trip to a dental clinic to understand the importance of dental care and even an educational visit to Jame Mosque and Regalia Museum in Bandar Seri Begawan where they delved into the cultural heritage of Brunei, these outings enriched their understanding of the world around them.





The phonics screening tests in June showcased the children's excellent progress in this foundational skill. World Book Day in March brought a day of fun and celebration as children donned impressive character costumes, immersing themselves in the joy of reading. Sports day in May was a highlight as the children enjoyed a day filled with activities and camaraderie.

Across the curriculum, the progress has been commendable. Narrative writing stood out as exceptional, demonstrating the children's creativity and storytelling skills. In maths, the children explored a wide range of topics including fractions, money, number, and geometry, showcasing their mathematical understanding.

In science, the children were captivated by the metamorphosis of tadpoles in the 'Animals including humans topic'. Reading progress was evident as the children advanced through the reading book bands, showcasing their growing literacy skills. History lessons delved into significant events such as the Great Fire of 1666 and the lives of inspiring individuals like Edith Cavell and Florence Nightingale.

ICT sessions provided a platform for the children to develop their digital skills using Purple Mash, with some creating exceptional spreadsheets and completing complex coding challenges. In PE, the children made significant strides across various areas, enhancing their physical capabilities.

Overall, it has been a truly rewarding year for both teachers, Mr Sherwin and Mr Leahy, and the Year 1 children, with notable achievements and memorable learning experiences.

Year 2 have continued to engage positively with the curriculum and embrace all of our learning opportunities.

In science we have been learning all about plants. The trip to Rimba Garden Centre was a real highlight for the children, with hands on experiences including potting seedlings and learning about a wide range of indoor and outdoor species. This trip also inspired the children to develop our outdoor garden and they have been remarkably successful with growing their own plants from seeds. The pupils have become more competent gardeners and have learnt that looking after flowering plants takes time, care and resilience. We are looking forward to harvesting the okra, corn, chillies and long beans in next couple of weeks.



As part of our theme on 'Great Explorers' the children took great pride in researching and presenting facts about different explorers in a nonchronological report. They also wrote some fantastic stories based around the text 'The Great Explorer' by Chris Judd. Our latest text 'Edward and Great Discovery' was a great source of inspiration for our writing unit on recounts. Healthy living been an important part of our learning this term and everyone has engaged positively in our DT project of smoothie making. The children used their creative skills to design their own brand of smoothie and label to stick on their cup. The practical session in the DT kitchen was great fun and the children were very proud of the outcome. Delicious smoothies were enjoyed by all during breaktime!



In maths, the children have been busy learning how to tell the time using analogue clocks. They have particularly enjoyed the practical aspect of data collecting and they were able to create tally charts, block diagrams and pictograms using real data from around the school. They have also been using the language of position and direction to set challenges for each other in the classroom.

The children have developed their core body strength and their fine motor skills in PE, enjoying a range of batting games such as rounders and tennis. Pupils from ISB came to visit for a mini football tournament, which was a worthwhile experience for all.

We are very proud of all the children in Year Two and their ongoing efforts this year. They have been a wonderful group of children to work with and they are all superstars!



Year 3

We had a very busy term in Year 3. We thoroughly enjoyed learning all about Ancient Egypt. We showcased all our learning by creating an Egyptian museum whereby all the children worked in small groups and devised a presentation, games and posters about their topic. Parents were amazed at all our awesome poems and we even had one pupil create their very own show that we down a storm! As the Nile provided lots of life in Ancient Egyptian times, we compared it to what life a river provides in current times by visiting Kampong Ayer in Bandar. We journeyed down the river in search of crocodiles and proboscis monkeys and were lucky enough to spot some monkeys in the trees on the river bank. We all had a fantastic time. There is no doubt that all the learners are ready for their new adventure in Year 4, but it's been a fantastic year in Year 3. We wish Mrs Webb well as she embarks on a new adventure in the UK.









Year 4

Mrs Bidhata Rai & Mr Mike Crichton

In English we explored a variety of writing genres including non-chronological reports, brochures and fairy tales. For each type of writing, the emphasis was on the children consciously adapting their writing to engage the reader. To do this they had to make deliberate decisions about which strategies and devices to use - fronted adverbials, subordinating clauses, variation in sentence length etc. During peer assessment sessions, they had to then explain and justify the choices they made. The results were very impressive.

In design technology, the children were given the task of designing a bridge that could withstand an earthquake. The learning began by exploring a range of bridge designs - beam, truss, suspension etc, with the merits of each design being evaluated. Having chosen and justified their choice of bridge, the children were engaged in planning their structure to meet specific criteria eg the span must be greater than 30cm and must be able to support a toy fire truck, and must incorporate specific joining techniques. Using straws, they then made a mock-up of their design. This resulted in amendments to the designs. With health and safety paramount, they learnt how to use saws and how to work alongside others when cutting, gluing etc. The children used a range of joining techniques including jinxs corners and lap joints. Accurate measuring and cutting was emphasised.










This term for science, Year 4 got a wonderful opportunity to visit the British Forces Broadcasting Station and take our learning beyond our classroom environment. The children found it useful to learn about the manipulation of sound – it was amazing to see the variation in wave formations with the change in pitch and volume. Every child was given a chance to use the microphone and see the waves change on screen in front of them. Their first-hand experience on how soundproofing works made understanding the phenomenon more realistic as they could see a presenter in the adjacent studio but not hear her. Children have also loved the hands-on science sessions when they designed both complete and incomplete circuits followed by elaborate elucidation of their understanding. They have enjoyed making predictions about materials that behave as insulators and conductors. This also involved in-depth discussions leading to various reasons for choosing the best metal to use for wiring.

PSHE has been fascinating to our 9-year olds this term as they are more aware of the changes they are and will be experiencing in the next few years of their lives. Not only did we discuss about the human life cycle and learned about ways and strategies to cope with various emotions and situations, but we have also managed to capture the basic information about how life begins.










